Possible Activities

Personal, Social & Emotional

Creating class rules with my friends.

Discuss feelings related to new class / transitions.

Sit in a circle and pass around a toy as a mascot. Ask the children to name something they like and dislike and explain their reasons why.

Literacy

Order and write the letters in my name.

Ask the children to draw a picture of themselves and their family. Can they write the names of their family members?

Provide a feelings chart with the feelings labelled. Encourage children to read the feelings then select their name and add it to the chart to show how they are feeling.

Communication & Language

Play a game of 'Guess Who?'. Choose a child to give clues (such as hair colour) to the class. Can the children guess who they are describing?

Using a permanent pen, write some labels on a beach ball, such as 'animal', 'colour', 'game', 'food' and 'toy'. Play a circle game, throwing the ball to a child. Can they think of a question to ask the group, using the prompts on the ball?

Physical Development

P.E Topic: Coordination (Footwork) and Static Balance (One Leg).

Introduce rules for P.E

Draw a selection of different faces on the ground in chalk. Offer the children chalk and encourage them to copy the faces. Can they create different shapes to make the faces?

All About Me!

Week 1: Settling in



Understanding the World

Ask the children to close their eyes and think of a place that is special to them. Can they tell a friend or class about their special place and why it is special to them?

Talk about the children's journeys to school. Do they walk or come in the car?

Invite children to take photos of each other using a camera. Print the photos and cut them into four or six pieces. Encourage children to build the picture puzzles up.

Mathematics

Routines of the day

Where things belong - Positional language (on, under, next to, behind)

Getting to know each other - measuring heights to create a class height chart.

Encourage each child to draw around their foot. Can they use cubes to measure how long their foot is? Who has the biggest foot? Who has the smallest foot?

Expressive Art & Design

Using paper plates and a range of media and materials, ask children to create a self-portrait.

Make an all about me pizza using different vegetables for the body parts.

Learn a range of songs that relate to bodies, such as 'Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes' and 'The Hokey Cokey'.

Possible Activities

Personal, Social & Emotional

Children to bring in a picture of their family and discuss with peers about their family life.

Explore different emotions with the children. Sit the children in a circle and play 'pass the feeling'.

Whisper a feeling to the first child, they make the expression and pass it on around the circle. Can the children guess what feeling it is?

Literacy

Children retell the story using puppets.

Create a wanted poster for Mummy Owl by drawing characters from the story and say/write initial sounds.

Practice writing our names / mark making & letter formation.

Provide children with resources to make owl paintings / puppets.

Make large scale pictures outdoors using things found in the natural environment.

Making bird feeders out of recycled milk bottles.


Practice using tweezers to pick up craft materials.
